That single frame captures reels of Jamison's life. And, like Poe, she lives with manic-depressive illness, a term she interchanges with "bipolar disorder." Her 1990 textbook on the topic, *Manic-Depressive Illness*, cowritten with Frederick Goodwin, MD, established her as a top expert on the illness.
